Arts & Entertainment

\$400: This singer, songwriter, and actress led the best-charting female music group in history. In 1976, *Billboard* named her the "Female Entertainer of the Century."

\$800: In 1968, she became the first Black American woman to star in her own weekly sitcom, Julia.

\$1200: This "High Priestess of Soul" was born in Tryon, North Carolina in 1933. She trained as a classical pianist but later gained fame as a singer and civil rights activist.

\$1600: This dancer, director, and choreographer founded his own dance company in 1958, which fused elements of modern dance, ballet, and jazz. His signature work, *Revelations*, is an interpretation of Black American history and is one of the most widely performed ballets in the world.

\$2000: This opera diva performed "La Marseillaise" at the 200th anniversary commemoration of the French Revolution in 1989. Other performance accolades include two presidential inaugurations, an Olympics opening ceremony, and a birthday celebration for Queen Elizabeth II.

History & Politics

\$400: In February 1960, four college students staged a sit-in at the Woolworth's lunch counter in this North Carolina city, which has since become home to the International Civil Rights Center and Museum.

\$800: In 1954, as NAACP chief counsel, he successfully argued for the desegregation of public schools before the United States Supreme Court. Thirteen years later, in 1967, he became the first African-American justice to serve on the nation's high court.

\$1200: Believed by many historians to be the oldest African-American holiday, this "second independence day" commemorates the ending of slavery in the United States. It was recognized as a federal holiday by act of the U.S. Congress in 2021.

\$1600: This term describes the mass movement of people which took place between 1916 and 1970, during which time an estimated six million Black Americans left their homes in the rural South and moved to cities in the urban North, Midwest, and West.

\$2000: With her opening statement to the House Judiciary Committee during the 1974 impeachment process against President Richard M. Nixon, this Texas congresswoman delivered what is now regarded as one of the greatest speeches of the 20th century.

Literature

\$400: Writers Ta-Nehisi Coates, Roxane Gay, and Yona Harvey have all written original stories that contributed to the larger mythos of this comic book hero.

\$800: In 1995, this author added to her extensive list of awards and honors by becoming the first science fiction writer ever to receive a MacArthur Fellowship.

\$1200: This *Notes of a Native Son* author and civil rights activist's FBI file contained a whopping 1,884 pages—the largest case the U.S. federal agency ever compiled on any writer.

\$1600: Unsatisfied with her publisher's limited advertising for her debut novel, this writer mailed thousands of promotional letters at her own expense. Five years later, her blockbuster third novel, *Waiting to Exhale*, sold more than three million copies.

\$2000: This writer and professor is the only woman and the only African American to twice win the National Book Award for Fiction. She won for her novels *Salvage the Bones* (2011) and *Sing, Unburied, Sing* (2017).

Science & Innovation

\$400: This physician and engineer became the first Black woman to travel into space when she served as a mission specialist aboard NASA's Space Shuttle *Endeavor* in 1992.

\$800: This 2016 book and its film adaptation chronicle the careers of mathematicians Mary Jackson, Katherine Johnson, and Dorothy Vaughan, who worked as "computers" (then a job description) at NACA and NASA during the U.S.-Soviet space race.

\$1200: In his laboratory at the Tuskegee Institute, George Washington Carver used these starchy vegetables to develop stamp glue.

\$1600: This native of Hurdle Mills, North Carolina is an immunologist and infectious disease expert who acted as the scientific lead on the NIH's Vaccine Research Center Coronavirus Team. In 2021, *TIME* named her one of four "Heroes of the Year" for her work in designing the SARS-CoV-2 spike protein for use in mRNA vaccine technology.

\$2000: George Franklin Grant was not only the first African-American member of the Harvard faculty, but in 1899 he received a U.S. patent for this essential piece of sporting equipment.

Sports

\$400: This baseball right fielder, nicknamed "the Hammer," broke Babe Ruth's home run record on April 8, 1974.

\$800: This sprinter's world records in the women's 100- and 200-meter dash events have remained unbroken since 1988, making her the fastest woman in recorded history.

\$1200: In 1988, Debi Thomas became the first Black American to win a medal at the Winter Olympic Games, competing in this event.

\$1600: In 1987, he became the first Black quarterback to lead an NFL team to a Super Bowl Championship. He was also voted MVP.

\$2000: With her wins in both the singles and doubles tournaments at the 1956 French Open, she became the first Black American to win a grand slam event in tennis.

Architecture & Design

In 1902, Julian Abele became the first African-American graduate of the University of Pennsylvania's Department of Architecture. He contributed to many famous designs throughout his career, but is perhaps best known as the chief designer and planner of this North Carolina university's gothic revivalist west campus, where a quad was renamed in his honor in 2016.
